
In Ephesians 4:1-7 Paul speaks of the importance of unity.



#### News from Alain & Katherine Niles

Dear Friends,

A lot has happened in the last few months here at the Hospital of Hope. Hard to put into words some of the recent events and there is a lot we can't share publicly, but we want to update you all so that you can join us in praying for the ministry here. It often feels like we're walking up hill...both ways...barefoot as we face trial after trial.

Power & Water: Our constant struggle! Over the last 2 months the water situation has been a real problem in Mango. We have always experienced regular power and water cuts since living here, but our "new normal" is for the water to be off more often than it is on. We are thankful for back up tanks and that, so far, it has not caused too many disturbances at the hospital.

**Sickness**: The bad water situation has caused many people in town and on our team to get sick from contaminated water.

Tensions in our town: We faced some recent tensions in our hospital which spilled over into town. It has been a long process of listening and identifying deep rooted problems. These situations are complicated and have forced us to pray and seek God's wisdom as we lead the hospital. We are thankful for strong relationships in town and with our local government.

So, why all these trials?

It might just be to test our faith. To keep us humble and relying on God. It might also be because God is doing incredible things here and we know the enemy is never pleased when people turn from darkness to light by His grace.

Village of Nali: Recently a short-term medical provider shared some hard results with a patient explaining that he had liver cancer, which had metastasized. The chaplain was called in and shared the gospel. The patient was eager to learn more and invited us to his village. We went a few days later and I was able to share the Good News with the man, his 3 wives and 14 children along with his

extended family. They were so receptive to the grace of Christ. We were reminded of the peace the gospel brings, especially when faced with mortality. Pray for this man and his family and for our chaplain team as we follow up with them.

100,000<sup>th</sup> Patient: On March 22<sup>nd</sup>, the hospital registered its 100,000<sup>th</sup> new patient. We still remember when the hospital reached its 10,000<sup>th</sup> new patient in the fall of 2015, about 6 months after opening. We are in awe of all that God has done these last 8 years: His provision for the hospital and for the many patients who have received care. Day after day we care for patients and walk them through difficult trials of their own. The last month we've seen many fascinating cases, infectious diseases, cancers, snakebites and every strange skin condition known to man...

People Who Come Serve: We are so grateful for the many people who give of their time, energy and resources to serve in Mango. We were blessed to welcome dear friends from Syracuse, NY, who came and worked alongside our team. It was such an encouragement to us!

Caleb: We are thankful that Caleb's broken wrist has healed and thankful that a bad cellulitis he developed in his elbow at the end of March cleared up quickly with the right antibiotics.

**MK School:** We have two more weeks of school! It has been a good school year, and we are now looking forward to our summer break.

Upcoming Plans: We have a busy summer ahead at HOH. Some of our career missionaries will be stepping away to get a break. We head into malaria season which is always busy as the rains come. Our family plans to get away for two weeks in July for some hiking and family time. Lots to look forward to.

# TAKING THE NEXT STEP TO RECLAIM. REVIVE. RENEW OUR BELOVED UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Council of Bishops President **Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton** released a brief video message for Annual Conferences and local churches. The presentation is intended for use at their gatherings and/or via their communication channels. It was filmed and produced by United Methodist Communications and is available for viewing below and **also for download on the NYAC video platform.** The piece was also published on the denomination's official website.

The message builds off of points included in Bishop Bickerton's <u>Mid-Term State of The United Methodist Church Address</u> and his address to the Council of Bishops (see below) in which he encouraged members to "reclaim, revive and renew" the beloved United Methodist connection.

"It's now time for you and me to work together to architect the next expression of United Methodism. The future of The United Methodist Church hinges on our ability to deeply pray that God will give us the strength and the courage to do what we must, what we have been called to do all along," stated Bishop Bickerton. "Let's offer our radical love, genuine hospitality, and sincere engagement."

He stressed the importance of members inviting others to church as "ministry is always about building relationships and it's always about taking someone along with you on the journey toward Christ-like holiness." And that a renewed focus and response to making disciples for Jesus Christ is needed because "the missional work we have before us is absolutely vital."

"What we have must be passed on with purpose and conviction," he added. "Our ministries, our faith in Christ, our presence in communities around the world. These are vibrant, lifegiving, transformative opportunities to make this world a better place – the place that God envisioned for all of us. . . where everyone can thrive."
