
If you are in need of pastoral services or interested in scheduling a baptism or joining the church, please contact one of the pastors.

Alain & Katherine Niles' Update

Dear Friends,

We have just finished one of the busiest seasons at the Hospital of Hope. Our hospital is usually very busy because of malaria and Typhoid season. This year was exceptionally bad. We hit multiple records in number of emergency room patients, inpatients, deliveries, blood transfusions, etc.... All around, busy!

We usually get a large number of patients from Burkina Faso who come across the border for care. Recently, with all of the unrest, many of the northern patients are afraid to risk their lives to drive through some dangerous areas to get across the border and down to the Hospital of Hope. Despite them not making it, we were flooded with local patients from within Togo. We are so thankful we were blessed with some incredible short term medical staff who helped us through the busiest of times.

There have been many incredible stories of God's healing in people's lives through quality care at the hospital. Recently, a pregnant woman came in pre-eclamptic and seizing. We were able to calm her seizures just in time to rush her to the OR for an emergency C-Section. The baby had no pulse or respiratory drive, so I resuscitated with our midwife and eventually got a heartbeat and stabilized the child's breathing. Both Mom and baby survived and were discharged healthy! I was able to have a good conversation with the family and rejoice with them that the ordeal ended well.

When there are highs, there are often many lows. Malaria season can be a discouraging time as children are rushed in unresponsive, anemic and lifeless, often too late for us to save them. While writing this letter, I was trying to think of how many children I ran codes on and pronounced dead over the last 3 months and I can't even remember. I filled out more death certificates than I have all year.

Despite the death and sadness, it is often in grief that we have the most opportunities to show and share the love of Jesus. Our hope is beyond the grave in the One who conquered death. Our house church is growing, maturing and faithful in getting together. We have been meeting in different homes in the neighborhood. We are working our way through 1 and 2 Peter and how to deal with suffering and persecution as a believer. Some of our friends who attend have faced rejection, persecution and loneliness for their faith and we are working on becoming a community for them. Pray for our group that God would raise up leaders among them.

Katherine is teaching and helping lead in the missionary kid school while a colleague is on furlough. The school is well set up and the students are thriving. Our kids love school. Camille is doing a lot of self-study while also working on French and piano. Caleb is always looking for lizards, insects, animals and the occasional snake. Mia-Joy has gotten into sewing and loves playing with her friends.

This week, I taught a church history course to our nursing students. This is one of the last Bible courses in their program. They will be graduating in July and are eager to jump into work in the hospital. We are so proud of these 15 students who are excelling in their nursing skills, but also maturing and open to issues of faith. Their questions about the Bible are so good and our hope is that they will keep growing in their knowledge and understanding of Christ.

Finally, looking ahead.....

-We are losing a Togolese doctor and friend who is leaving to do further training. We are in the process of hiring another Togolese doctor to take his place. Pray that he integrates well.

-We are working on building a small water tower at our home to help with the water cuts and shortages.

-Mia-Joy turned 7, Caleb will turn 10 soon and in January, Camille will turn 14.

-End of Dec/early Jan we will be flying to Senegal to spend time with family and celebrate my parents' retirement and anniversary.

Updates From Pastor Dawn

Stamford Presbyterian/Methodist

Our Stamford Presbyterian/Methodist church has had a very busy few months. Members have assisted with Worship at the Assisted Living Center, provided food assistance to those in need and took a special offering for survivors of the Stamford fires. For the Holiday season, members collected baskets and items for the staff of Robinson Terrace, the Assisted Living Center and homebound members. They also hosted and volunteered by wrapping presents and hosting the distribution of the Christmas Feeling Fund. At the Christmas Eve service, a special offering will be taken for Disaster Relief.

Harpersfield

Harpersfield members have been actively involved in several community ministries. They help with Worship at the Assisted Living Center and hosted a Veteran's Day Worship Service. The Veteran's Day Worship was well received and will become a yearly tradition. They collected 22 shoe boxes for the Christmas Shoebox ministry. The merger with Grand Gorge has finally been approved by the court. Now members will be working on preparing the property to be sold. They continue to host potluck suppers after worship and many members are actively involved in service with the Grange. A special offering was taken for the survivors of the Stamford fire. And in December, the members participated with Gilboa in the Cookie Ministry, in which members made cookies and put them in tins. These will be distributed to residents at the Assisted Living Center.

Conesville Chapel

Conesville Chapel members and youth and children have been so giving to their community this year. They hosted an event to honor the Veteran's, made blankets for community members, sent notes to those in nursing homes and members this fall/winter. The Children and Youth presented a wonderful Christmas program on December 17th. The children and youth meet weekly for Sunday School and members meet for worship the 1st and 3rd Sundays at 4p followed by a potluck.

A Word from the Heart....

The New Year always brings us an opportunity for a Fresh Start...in fact that is the name of our sermon series for January until Lent begins. What does it mean to have a fresh start? Many people make resolutions, some of the most common are to lose weight, exercise more, get organized, learn a new skill or hobby, see friends and family more, save more money or spend less money, etc.

I think that those are very important ways to start the New Year, but I also think it is important to make a "fresh start" with some spiritual resolutions. For example, take up a new spiritual discipline that you might not be doing (spiritual disciplines are: prayer, bible study, worship, generosity, meditation and service). Or another example is to commit to doing the Lenten bible study that Pastor Peg and I will be leading. Or another that fits both exercise more and adding a spiritual discipline would be to start the Prayer Walk (Wednesdays at 3 on sections of the Catskill trail). We will be giving more practical examples of ways you can have a Fresh Start spiritually in the sermon series.

Some may think, "I am too old to start new ways of doing things". However, having a Fresh Start isn't necessarily about starting new ways as much as adding a little more God to your day. And we can all use a little more time with God! Blessings to all!!!

Greetings to Everyone in the Delaware Headwater's Charge,

First of all, I wish all of you a very Merry Christmas. December 26 will be the 6 th month anniversary of Michael's and my move to this beautiful area of the Catskills. We've had such a good time since we came and have been enjoying the nature, fresh food, and the various wonders of the region.

Right now there's snow on the ground, which we can expect in the Catskills, but not necessarily in Bethlehem at this time of year. When I was a kid, I always wondered about all those hymns with snow, because I knew Jesus was born in the mid-East, where it's hot. But I later found out that during the night at this time of year it can be very cold, so the idea of a family staying warm in the stable is not out of place. And that gets me to wonder about that first Christmas eve. A night when all the animals and people were snuggled inside their houses and under covers to keep away from the cold.

When Jesus was born, he was brought into a quiet world, not a noisy one. We are used to the noise of the angels singing, but really it was probably more of a Silent Night. But often that's how great miracles happen, not with a lot of fanfare but quietly, coming upon us one step at a time, until they're revealed to us, or until we finally notice them.

It gets me thinking: What miracles are quietly approaching us right now? That's one of the messages of the Christmas story, to expect miracles in unexpected places, like the Son of God, born in the unexpected and unlooked for manger.
